We, now, are responsible to do what we can do and with the knowledge we now, have to pass onto future generation what we benefit from living in Nillumbik. we are part of an invisible network where change in once area be it increased population or housing or hard surfaces housing or a new weedkiller produce unintended consequences.

Together these unintended consequences like climate change are becoming well known, others are not, and knowledge is being developed and needs to be highlighted. Trees matter put so do the small microbiological networks that supports tree health but we do not generally know they exist. Bees and pollinators matter - from purely self-interest point of food production.

Candidate personal motivation to protect and enhance biodiversity in Nillumbik:

In Nillumbik we have a largely intact green wedge. Our shire is the home to many incredible indigenous birds and animals. Contact with these animals brings wonder and meaning to my life. Seasonal moments like the flowering of the first wattle, wood ducks possessing tree hollows before nesting, the late spring arrival of the Jewel spider, (with its tiny polychromatic spikes), and the emergence of dragonflies after enough warmth and light add rhythm to my year. Once, a soaring eagle lifted me up in a moment of despair; I spotted gang gangs feeding in a roadside verge I look after; I came upon a mother and baby wombat foraging safely by our creek; I stood by a roadside echidna as it buried its head to disappear. Fleeting moments I will remember forever, and which make me part of a bigger whole.

We are at a time when biodiversity is under immense pressure worldwide. The greatest threat is apathy. I am committed to the protection of biodiversity to give other species a chance to survive. More than that, I am passionate about the improvement of biodiversity to help our flora and fauna, and us, thrive.

<u>Sarah Hunter – full comments</u>

Understanding of the concept of biodiversity – score 4.9/5

Biodiversity relates to both flora and fauna. A very important part of this is habit for indigenous species of animals including microorganisms, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals. To provide good habitat we need to recognise environmental complexity including geology, water quality and decaying matter as well as as the more commonly considered fauna. We also need to take account of a greater range of organisms when revegetating or protecting the environment.

Identification of local threats to biodiversity – score 5/5

All of the above issues are significant concerns. The council has a role to play in terms of education and planning decision making, to minimise the loss of biodiversity through vegetation removal and displacement by invasive species. The council can support biodiversity through the ongoing support and increase in funds for the LMIP and support for community volunteer groups such as 'friends of' and Landcare groups. The council needs to provide leadership and demonstrate win-win biodiversity outcomes by implementing best practice management regimes. It needs to not only stop the decline in biodiversity but pro-actively build the biodiversity resource through revegetation programs in public open space, on rural roadsides, and in urban areas. This can be nuanced, fire responsive, and beautiful as well as providing utilitarian benefits include wind attenuation and shelter during extreme weather conditions.

Power of local government to promote biodiversity – score 4.9/5

Council should support the landowner and volunteer efforts to support biodiversity. As noted in the survey they should also take direct action as a body of government to control invasive species, and in my opinion should be directly funding revegetation programs that take account of relevant location specific details (EVC's, fire risk, spatial context etc) to enhance biodiversity but also aim to deliver other benefits to residents and ratepayers including wind attenuation, shade and shelter and beautification

These include habitat links, efforts to protect water quality and reduce flood risk through WSUD and the engagement of the community in biodiversity based activities that build understanding and stewardship of nature and biodiversity.


