Nillumbik community has a strong and active culture of volunteer stewardship of the land, its soils, waterways, indigenous plants, fungi and creatures. We love the diverse plant and animal life who share this space with us. Our peri-urban environment, characterised by a patchwork of urban and rural features, national parks, reserves, and bush blocks is truly unique.

We consider that Nillumbik Shire Council must prioritise biodiversity through conservation, protection and reinvigoration of the natural environment, careful attention to soil and waterways, and encouraging growth and flourishing of indigenous flora and fauna.

Here are Nillumbik Council's two goal sets in its 2024-2034 Biodiversity Strategy which utilises 14 indicators to assist in tracking successful progress towards achieving those goals. For the next 4 years Council will endorse an annual implementation plan that lists the action that will be prioritised that year. The Year 1 Biodiversity Implementation Plan (2024-25) will be considered at one of the
